Dear Parents and carers

Another week has passed in school and we have all settled into our new study themes linked to our texts. It is fantastic to see and hear our children being inspired to write by the different texts used around the classes.

This week we have supported the anti-bullying campaign for 2023 and this year the theme has been 'Make a Noise' about bullying.. Anti-Bullying Week 2023 is coordinated



in England and Wales by the Anti-Bullying Alliance and marked a lots of schools up and down the country.

Bullying affects millions of lives and can leave us feeling hopeless. The theme of Make A Noise About Bullying came about following consultation with teachers and pupils by the Anti-Bullying Alliance. Teachers and children wanted a theme that empowered them to do something positive to counter the harm and hurt that bullying causes.

Too often, we are silent when we see bullying take place, silent about the hurt bullying causes, and silent when we

hear bullying dismissed as 'just banter'. So, let's Make a Noise about bullying and ensure that it doesn't have to be this way. Whether we are young or a little bit older we can all try and behave in a way that is



respectful and kind to everyone.

Of course, we won't like everyone and we don't always agree, but we can choose respect and unity.

To start the week we wore Odd Socks to school. Adults and children in the school wore odd socks for the day to celebrate what makes us all unique. This has then been followed by



assemblies and activities in class during our PSHE time. Whilst it is an important week to promote we were keen to work with the children to ensure that the messages we worked on are carried on through every week in school.

Today we supported Children in Need by

wearing anything "Pudsey" to school. A huge thank you to all who made a donation a total of £150 was raised for this very worthy cause.



As you will have seen from my letter earlier this week we received our Gold Assessment for Rights

Respecting Schools just before October half term. We were delighted to be assessed as attaining the Gold level and receive such a good report. Bunbury has been a UN Rights Respecting School for a number of years after achieving the bronze and silver awards in 2017 and 2018. Since then we have worked incredibly hard to ensure that the principles behind being a Rights Respecting school are embedded and run through the culture and work we do within school.

Being a Rights Respecting school has enabled our children to be able to articulate:

- That they know and understand the UN convention on the rights of the child and can describe how it impacts on their lives and on the lives of children everywhere
- That they are safe and protected and know what to do if they need support
- That as a school we prioritise their social and emotional wellbeing
- That they are included and valued as individuals
- That they are involved in making decision about their education
- That their views are taken seriously
- That they have taken action to uphold their rights and the rights of other locally and globally

It was clearly evident that children's rights are embedded across the school and underpin every facet of school life at Bunbury.

Of course, such an accreditation would not be possible without the whole staff team working together to ensure our approach is consistent, valued and upheld by all. As always I am extremely grateful and humbled by the work the staff do in supporting me with my vision as without them such awards would not be possible. I would also like to thank Miss Hickson for her work as Rights Respecting Work who has not only collated all our evidence and documentation but also encouraged the staff team to keep striving for that gold.

Thank you all also for your kind comments which have been sent to me via email, at the school gate or on our Facebook page. Your support as always is very much appreciated.



Attendance

Attendance at school is important both academically and for social/emotional reasons. Whilst we understand that pupils will be absent from time to time due to illness; absence from school for other reasons should only be for exceptional circumstances. As a school we look at each request for leave from school on a case by case basis and absences in term time will only be permitted under exceptional circumstances. Unless there are exceptional circumstances, holidays taken in term time will be unauthorised and maybe subject to a fine.

Where attendance falls below 90% for any pupil, we will contact you to discuss this and put in any additional support if needed. From this week we will be working with an attendance family support worker, Elisha Wollaston, across the trust to support families where absence may be persistent or below our threshold. This is a supportive role and is focused on putting in support as and where needed.

Each academic year has 190 school days, this leaves 175 non-school days for family time, holidays, visits and non-urgent appointments. If a pupil is absent for just 1 day each term that equals 6 days or 39 hours a year of lost learning.

Attendance at school enables us all to build a strong team and to strengthen our learning powers. Our overall attendance for whole school is currently 96.66% which is 1.59% above the national figure and above other North

West schools.





Safe, KIND and respectful

I was delighted this week to be given a beautiful Christmas wreath for our school front door. Charlie (year 3) and Alice (reception) made this fantastic wreath and very kindly gave it to school to display over the festive period. A huge thank you to both pupils for such a KIND gesture.

As a school we promote kind, safe and respectful behaviour and we hope that this is reflected within our wider school community.

This year, very sadly, there was no representation from our own Scout Group, the 25th South-West Cheshire.

The sections of Bunbury Scout Group - Beavers, Cubs and Scouts, have been run each week by volunteer leaders, people who give up a couple of hours each week to deliver exciting and interesting activities to our children. These sessions are structured, engaging and good fun and allow the children to gain many life skills, enjoy teambuilding, exercise and engage with the natural world.

I have been part of Bunbury Scout Group for over 20 years. I have enjoyed many wonderful times with adults and children within our Group, as have many other parents who have volunteered over that time.
